





INCOME TAX REVENUE INCREASED RELIANCE ON INCOME TAX REVENUE



PORTION OF INCOME TAXES CREDITED TO OTHER CITIES




STATE THREATS TO THE LOCAL INCOME TAX

Centralized collection in Columbus- HB 49


- Reduces ability at the local level to collect taxes on a timely basis, to pursue uncollected taxes, reporting analysis, and to ensure accuracy.
- This could be a substantial loss in collections to the City.

■ Residency Taxation – HB 382, SB 206

- HB 382
 - Taxes only residents of a municipality, not those who work in (and receive benefits from) a municipality
 - Compensation for personal services or sole proprietors
- **SB** 206
 - Provides credit (10-20%) to non-resident taxpayers in a municipality
 - Impacts larger cities for now (collections over \$100 million)




Property Tax Dollar



boards & commissions.





- Capital Equipment Purchase Fund \$720,000







POLICE EXPENSES AS A PERCENT OF GENERAL FUND



WASTE COLLECTION FUND REVENUE & EXPENSES






