PUBLIC HEARING FOR ORDINANCE NUMBER 03-09: FEES FOR APPLICATIONS, PERMITS, AND INSPECTIONS

Steve Feverston reported that this ordinance replaces the old fee ordinance and sets the fees required in the new Unified Development Ordinance. It updates fees to bring them into line with the charges of most local communities. Mayor Kingseed asked when the fees were last changed. Mr. Feverston stated that some of the subdivision fees dated back to 1981 while others were revised in 1998. The Mayor noted that the changes are designed to cover the costs of the administration process. Mr. Beals sponsored Ordinance Number 03-09, An Ordinance Establishing A Schedule Of Fees For Certain Applications, Permits And Inspections Required By Ordinance Number 14-08, The Unified Development Ordinance Of The City Of Centerville and Repealing Ordinance Number 10-98 In Its Entirety and moved that it be passed. Mr. Singer seconded the motion. The ordinance passed with seven ayes.

PUBLIC HEARING ORDINANCE NUMBER 04-09: AMENDING THE ADMINISTRATIVE FEE FOR REMOVAL OF WEEDS, VINES AND GRASS

Mr. Horn noted that the increase in this fee would recoup more of the City's expenses for following up on maintenance issues. Mrs. Wilder explained that the administrative fee would be added to costs associated with mowing unattended areas on private property within the City. She described the administrative process and the steps requiring staff's involvement. A survey of nearby cities showed that most add charges between \$100 and \$150 per violation. At this time we are recommending an administrative fee of \$100; we would notify all residents who have had a recent violation of the change. Dr. Gresham sponsored Ordinance Number 04-09, An Ordinance Amending Section 660.14 Of The Codified Ordinances Of The City Of Centerville To Revise The Administrative Fee For Removal Of Offensive Weeds, Vines and Grass By The City In The Centerville Municipal Code and moved that it be passed. Mr. Cline seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.
