Ms. Goodrich presented a plaque and a Yankee Trace gift certificate to Tim Suttmiller, of Cross Pointe Center. Ms. Goodrich noted that the other award and certificate would be delivered to Mary Ellen Lee at Pieces of Style.

The Mayor congratulated them and thanked them for their service to the City. During the Mayor's Report, Mayor Kingseed noted the following: He thanked the Centerville-Washington Township Historical Society for the efforts of its members in bringing the Chautauqua to Centerville. The week-long event was very well received by the Community. Mr. Horn offered the following in the City Manager's Report: The Miami Valley Communications Council does much more than broadcast local programming. The Council is also a council of governments that has the authority to act on behalf of its members in a variety of ways-TCSU and the natural gas aggregation program are prime examples. Gas aggregation savings are currently available to Centerville residents. Several years ago the Ohio Legislature deregulated natural gas supplies, allowing more companies to enter into Ohio markets for competition in pricing. In May 2003 Centerville residents voted nearly four to one in favor of giving Council the right to work with MVCC to obtain reduced rates. Recently an opportunity for residential customers and small business users became available to save money through Interstate Gas Supply with MVCC as aggregator. Eligible residents and small businesses are receiving letters with details of the program. There are no fees or penalties from Vectren or IGS associated with this opt-out program. The average residential customer will save about fifty dollars annually with the program when compared with Vectren's rate. Mr. Horn discussed the legislation on the Consent Agenda. He explained a resolution concerning an existing MCI cable on City of Centerville property just south of the corner of Yankee Street and Social Row Road. The legislation accepts a payment for a ten foot easement. Another resolution gives permission to ODOT to pave I-675 within the city limits of Centerville. There is no cost to the City. The final piece of legislation concerns a request from ODOT to lower the speed limit from forty-five to forty miles per hour on SR 48 from Alex-Bell Road north to Whipp Road. Part of the roadway is in the City of Centerville and part is in the unincorporated area. ODOT needs Council's approval to proceed.
