FRIENDS OF BENHAM'S GROVE APPEAL TO COUNCIL

The Public Hearing was held concerning an Appeal filed by the Friends of Benham's Grove against a decision rendered by the Planning Commission to deny the construction of an accessory structure in the front yard of property located at 166 North Main Street, owned by the City of Centerville. Mr. Feverston reviewed the Variance Application submitted to the Planning Commission by the Friends of Benham's Grove for the construction of this Pergola in the southwest corner of the property. The Planning Commission, considering this as a building rather than a structure, unanimously denied the variance requested. City Council during a Work Session agreed with the Planning Commission that this was a structure, but believed that, in this location, it was necessary in order to help mitigate some of the visual impacts from neighborhood businesses. Mr. Feverston explained that there is a solid board privacy fence along the south property line. Mr. Horn outlined how this Pergola enhances the property. Mrs. Lienesch, due to the unique situations and to environmental issues to the site, moved that the decision of the Planning Commission be reversed, and that the Variance Application be granted.
