PARK ESTATES RECORD PLAN		
Mr. Kenning reported on the Planning Commission Me September 24, 1991. Mr. Schwab reviewed a revision to Plan for Park Estates approved in 1990 for property loc of Centerville Station Road, east of Stonehouse Court a Black Oak East Park. The subject 7.928 acre tract of 1 zoned R-1c, single family residential. This Plan diffe the previously approved Plan by a reduction of lots fro residential. Mr. Schwab identified adjacent zone class and current land uses. He reviewed Planning Commission unanimous recommendation for approval of this Record Pl Council, subject to the following conditions:	a Record ated north and west of and is rs from m 11 to 8 ifications

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1. Lot 9 must be designated on the Record Plan as a park lot. The developer shall execute and deliver to the Centerville/Washington Park District a general warranty deed conveying lot 9 to the Park District prior to the signing by the City of the Record Plan. The deed shall meet all the requirements of the City Parkland Dedication Ordinance.

2. A 10 foot wide walkway easement shall be provided on the Record Plan to provide access from Jaime Rose Way to the Park. This easement shall be improved with a 2 foot wide concrete walk of a design approved by the City Engineer. The location of the walkway is to be determined by the City and the Park District.

3. A covenant approved by the City Attorney shall be added to the Record Plan which prohibits any lot from having direct vehicular access to Centerville Station Road.

4. A covenant approved by the City Attorney shall be added to the Record Plan which permits emergency maintenance access by the City to the stormwater detention area at the northeast corner of lots 4 and 5.

5. In lieu of adding one (1) lane of pavement including curb, gutter, sidewalk, and stormwater improvements, across the entire frontage along Centerville Station Road, the developer shall pay an amount approved by the City Engineer to the City to be used for the future widening of Centerville Station Road.

6. A stormwater drainage plan shall be approved by the City Engineer showing stormwater drainage calculations and incorporating retention and/or detention and erosion control during construction in accordance with the provisions of the City Stormwater Drainage Control Ordinance.

7. The developer shall enter into a Subdivider's Agreement with the City including a Performance Bond in an amount approved by the City Engineer to assure construction of the public improvements.

8. The plans for water lines and fire hydrants shall be subject to the approval of the Washington Township Fire Department.

Mr. Schwab reviewed for Council a recommendation from the City Engineer that this Record Plan be approved subject to receipt of the following:

1. A Subdivider's Agreement.

2. A Performance Bond in the amount of \$74,000 to cover the costs of pavement, curb and gutter, storm sewer and sidewalk improvements on cul-de-sac's public right-of-way. If a separate bond is posted for sidewalks, the amount should be \$9,600.

bond is posted for sidewalks, the amount should be \$9,600. 3. The establishment of an escrow account of \$30,000, which is the estimated developer's cost for the widening of Centerville Station Road to subdivision standards in lieu of actual construction. (Profile improvements should be made in conjunction with any of the subdivision widening of Centerville Station Road).

4. Inspection Fee in the amount of \$324.00.

Mr. Brad Judge, John W. Judge Engineering Company, representing the developer Beverly Tipton, offered their concurrence with all conditions of approval outlined previously by Mr. Schwab.

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Upon question of Mayor Heintz, Mr. Tipton advised that the creek running through this development will not overflow the residential lot nearest the creek.

residential lot nearest the creek. Mr. Beasley moved that the revised Record Plan for Park Estates be approved subject to all conditions recommended by the Planning Commission and the City Engineer. Mr. Kingseed seconded the motion. The motion passed by unanimous vote.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 22-91 WHITES CORNER ROAD

Mr. Kenning reviewed a proposed Ordinance to change the name of a portion of Wilmington Pike to Whites Corner Road. The realignment of Wilmington Pike at Alexandersville-Bellbrook Road leaves a small portion of old Wilmington Pike needing a separate identity. Whites Corner has been recommended due to the fact that the old neighborhood retained that name. Mrs. Beals moved that Ordinance Number 22-91, An Ordinance Changing The Name of A Portion Of Wilmington Pike To Whites Corner Road In The City Of Centerville, Ohio, be set for Public Hearing on November 18, 1991. Mr. Singer seconded the motion. The motion passed by unanimous vote.

RESOLUTION NUMBER 36-91 WHIPP ROAD

Mr. Kenning reviewed a proposed Resolution to provide for the reconstruction, widening and straightening of the curve of East Whipp Road from State Route 48 eastward to its intersection with Hewitt Road. This is a joint project between the City of Centerville, the City of Kettering, Montgomery County, the State of Ohio and the United States Department of Transportation. Mr. Kenning advised that the State of Ohio is prepared to go to Bid for this project during the month of November of this year. Mr. Compton sponsored Resolution Number 36-91, Final Resolution, Adopting Plans; Proposing To Co-operate; Requesting Director To Proceed; (Chapter 5521, Ohio Revised Code), and moved that it be passed. Mr. Stone seconded the motion. The motion passed with six votes in favor, Mrs. Beals abstained.

STORMWATER MANAGEMENT MASTER PLAN

Mr. Singer, speaking as Chairman of the Stormwater Drainage Task Force Committee, recognized Members Gerald Glasgow and Richard Welch in attendance at this Meeting. He gave a brief overview of the work of the Committee since its inception. Mr. Singer reviewed the Final Report prepared by Camp Dresser & McKee, environmental engineers, scientists, planners, and management consultants. He announced a Public Meeting scheduled for Thursday, November 7, 1991 at which time the Consultant will give an indept explanation and review of the Stormwater Management Master Plan prepared for the City of Centerville. The Meeting will take place in the Council Chambers at 7:30 P.M. Mr. Singer outlined the following recommendations made by the Task Force Committee after their review of the Final Plan.

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Mr. David Dean, 1550 Ambridge Road, defined "citizen" and "developer". He believes the scales are tipped in favor of developers in the City of Centerville. He asked Council to address the drainage question seriously.

Mr. Dwight Swank, 141 Sheldon Drive, defined water and structural damage due to storms in his neighborhood since the development of the plat. He asked Council to help improve drainage situations in his area.

Mrs. June Lavin, 144 Sheldon Drive, outlined inconveniences her neighborhood has experienced during the past 35 years. She asked for some consideration in the future.

Donna Hoying, 120 Terrace Villa Drive, defined the problem of standing water upon her residential lot. She questioned whether data was reviewed before priorities were established for stormwater drainage control.

Mr. Brooks Cavender, 1051 Ambridge Road, expressed his concern with water run-off into his neighborhood from the extension of Clyo Road and the development of properties to the north. He asked City Council to look further into proper drainage when new developments are presented for approval.

Mayor Heintz advised that questions raised during this Meeting relative to the drainage study just completed by Camp Dresser & McKee, should be asked of the consultant at the Public Meeting scheduled for November 7, 1991.

Mr. Jay Rutherford, 1325 Ambridge Road, pointed out the fact that property immediately to the north of his property is for sale and will be developed sometime in the future. He asked that Council require developers to be more accountable to properties down stream in consideration of proper drainage.

Mrs. Barbara Cervay submitted to the City Petitions containing 236 signatures from 158 homes located in the Black Oak Estates, Black Oak Forest, Pelbrook Farms and Terrace Villa areas requesting that certain points be addressed in response to the Final Report prepared by Camp Dresser & McKee.

Mr. Singer pointed out the fact that the City has had a Stormwater Drainage Ordinance since 1985 which requires the developer to provide for proper drainage down stream. Following review of this legislation, the consultant has recommended changes which will strengthen the Ordinance.

Mrs. Beals pointed out the fact that developments since 1985 and the passage of the Stormwater Drainage Ordinance have not experienced the flooding problems experienced in earlier developments, developments such as Black Oak Estates, Black Oak Forest and the Terrace Villa Plat.

Mr. Beasley moved that City Council send the Petitions to the Stormwater Drainage Task Force Committee for review, consideration and recommendation. Discussion followed relative to the pros and cons of sending the Petitions to the Task Force in consideration of the fact that they were submitted to City Council and this matter will be discussed during Budget Sessions by City Council. The motion died for lack of a second.

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NESTLE CREEK SECTION THREE PERFORMANCE BOND REDUCTION

Mr. Kenning reviewed a report received from the City Engineer that essentially all public improvements except for the final course of asphalt pavement and sidewalks in Nestle Creek, Section Three, have been completed. He recommended that the Performance Bond posted for this Section of Nestle Creek be reduced to \$24,000 which is sufficient to cover the final lift of asphalt and remaining sidewalk installation. Mrs. Beals moved that the Performance Bond on Nestle Creek, Section Three, be reduced to \$24,000.00 as recommended by the City Engineer. Mr. Kingseed seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

CENTERVILLE ARTS COMMISSION RILEY AND MEININGER

Mayor Heintz advised that Mr. Terry Riley and Mrs. Carolyn Meininger have submitted applications for appointment as members of the Centerville Arts Commission. Mr. Stone moved that Mr. Terry Riley and Mrs. Carolyn Meininger be appointed as members of the Centerville Arts Commission. Mr. Compton seconded the motion. The motion passed by unanimous vote.

CITY PLANNING COMMISSION HOSFELD AND MCMAHON

Mayor Heintz advised that the terms of Mr. Robert Hosfeld and Mr. Peter McMahon as members of the City Planning Commission will soon expire. Mr. Singer moved that Mr. Robert Hosfeld and Mr. Peter McMahon be appointed to an additional term as members of the City Planning Commission. Mrs. Beals seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

There being no further business, the Meeting was adjourned.
