Council concurred that a decision be made at the next Work Session Meeting.

Mr. George Chamberlain, Miami Valley Regional Transit Authority Board of Trustees President, outlined reasons for not revisiting the question of dismantling electrical overhead trolley wires in Montgomery County. Wires presently being removed are only those in construction areas; wiring will not be removed overall until 1994 when sub-stations are vacated. Diesel transit vehicles being purchased by RTA now and in the future are much cleaner than those being traded. Council concurred not to support revisiting the question of dismantling electrical wires as proposed by the City of Oakwood's Transportation Committee Delegate, Carlo McGinnis. City Engineer Norbert Hoffman was present during discussion of this item on the agenda.

Pros and cons were outlined concerning an Ordinance to prohibit picketing in residential areas in the City of Centerville: should families and neighbors be subjected to such action, and should people be deprived of this right in certain circumstances. Council concurred that this matter again be discussed during the next Work Session Meeting.

Mr. Haverland gave a brief update on the recycling program in Centerville and activities of the Recycling Task Force. 50 percent of Centerville residents are involved in the program. Two mini-packer loads of semi-compacted recyclables are taken to St. Vincent's weekly. A survey will soon be sent to homeowners seeking their assessment of the recycling program. This report will be forthcoming in April from the Task Force to City Council. The Task Force is presently considering the collection of recyclables from condominium and apartment complexes in Centerville. Upon request of Mayor Heintz, the City will review

the use of recycled paper.

Mr. Haverland updated Council on activities concerning Property Maintenance in the City of Centerville during 1989. A total of 74 complaints were received of which 70 were handled by City Staff, 3 reviewed by the Property Review Commission, and 1 still in process.

Mr. Kenning advised that the final draft of the Municipal Code has been received by the City.
