Following a short recess in this Meeting, Mayor Heintz announced the Christmas Decorating Contest which will be sponsored by the City Beautiful Commission during the holiday season.

Mrs. McLaughlin announced the receipt of a letter of resignation from Sister City Committee Member Ruby Hurley. Mr. Taylor moved that the resignation of Ruby Hurley from the Sister City Committee be accepted with regret. Mr. Siler seconded the motion. A roll call vote resulted in seven ayes in favor of the motion.

Mayor Heintz made the following announcements: The Centerville-Washington Park District will observe their 25th Anniversary on Wednesday, October 17, 1984.

Beggars Night in Centerville is scheduled for Tuesday, October 30, 1984 between the hours of 6:00 and 8:00 P.M.

The Proposed amendments to the Centerville City Charter are being advertised in The Times, once on the 10th day of October and once on the 17th day of October, 1984. These will be before the electorate on November 6. The proposed amendments will also be explained in the October issue of the Centerville Town Crier and copies are available at the Centerville Municipal Building.

An exchange between Senior Citizens from Centerville and Senior Citizens from Waterloo took place in Waterloo, Ontario Canada for the Oktoberfest, and was very successful.

Mr. Kenning thanked Mr. Ralph Bray for taking the pictures of the homes which received City Beautification Awards. Mr. Bray is one of the City's volunteer workers.

ALEX-BELL VETERINARY CLINIC

Mr. Kenning reported on the Planning Commission Meeting held September 25, 1984. Mr. Schwab reviewed a proposed Site Plan for the Alex-Bell Veterinary Clinic to be located north of Alexandersville-Bellbrook Road and east of Loop Raod. The zoning of the subject one acre property is B-2 and is surrounded by land with the same zoning classification. Mr. Schwab reviewed the following Staff recommendation made to the Planning Commission: the proposed Site Plan be approved with the following conditions:

1. A five foot wide concrete sidewalk, of a design approved by the City Engineer, be constructed in the public right-of-way along Loop Road across the front of the property.

2. A fire hydrant approved by the Washington Township Fire Department shall be constructed.

3. A detailed plan for storm water retention, including erosion control,

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approved by the City Engineer, shall be required.

4. A revised Site Plan must be submitted and approved by the City Planner which reduces the potential vehicular conflicts at the common curb cut to Loop Road.

Mr. Schwab also reviewed Deed Restrictions placed upon the total acreage, limiting curb cuts along Loop Road and along Alexandersville-Bellbrook Road. The Planning Commission expressed concern with the width of the paved area along the south property line of this one acre parcel and with interior vehicular movement. In consideration of the Staff recommendation and the Planning Commission's inability to solve potential problems, the Planning Commission voted unanimously to recommend denial of this Site Plan to City Council. Mr. Schwab reviewed a Revised Plan submitted to City Council changing the configuration of the west parking area, locating a proposed sign being in conflict with the setback requirements of the Zoning Ordinance and including discrepancies between the scale and figures on the Site Plan.

Dr. B. A. Diehl, Applicant, explained the changes made between the original Site Plan for the Veterinary Clinic and the Revised Plan (Option 2). Mr. Taylor pointed out the fact that the curb cut design into this property may not be what the City intended, but the Applicant has met all his legal requirements.

Mr. Stone moved that the Site Plan "Option 2" for the Alex-Bell Veterinary Clinic be approved subject to the following conditions:

 A detailed storm water drainage plan be submitted to the City and approved by the City Engineer.

 A five foot wide concrete sidewalk, of a design approved by the City Engineer, be constructed in the public right-of-way along Loop Road across the front of the property.
That the sign be relocated to conform to the requirements of the

3. That the sign be relocated to conform to the requirements of the Centerville Zoning Ordinance.

 In the case of a conflict between a labeled dimension on the approved Site Plan and the actual drawn scaled dimension, the labeled dimension shall prevail.

5. A fire hydrant as approved by the Washington Township Fire Department be constructed, if necessary.

The design of the curb cut off Loop Road into the property be subject to the approval of the City Engineer.

Mr. Samples seconded the motion. A roll call vote resulted in seven ayes in favor of the motion.

STATION HOUSE ACRES

Mr. Taylor moved that the Conditional Use Request and Preliminary Plan submitted for Station House Acres to provide for a Residential Development Plan for the property located south of Centerville Station Road and east of Southbury Drive, be set for Public Hearing on November 19, 1984. Mr. Siler seconded the motion. A roll call vote resulted in seven ayes in favor of the motion.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 33-84 EXISTING STRUCTURES CODE

The Public Hearing was held concerning Ordinance Number 33-84. Mr. Kenning reviewed this proposed Ordinance which deals with the interior and exterior maintenance of existing structures in the City of Centerville. This matter has been subject of discussion for several years; the Ordinance has been developed by the Zoning Task Force and has been reviewed by the Board of Architectural Review and the Planning Commission. The Ordinance is designed to provide controls which may be necessary as neighborhoods grow in years, controls on the local level rather than through Montgomery County as now exist. Mr. Kenning outlined the creation and purpose of the Centerville Property Review Commission, created in this Ordinance.

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Mrs. Marian Simmons, 1460 Taitwood Drive, expressed various concerns with the Ordinance as proposed. She believes that controls are necessary but fails to see a need for local controls vs. the controls now being provided by Montgomery County. She believes the cost factor should be more thoroughly reviewed. She believes that the creation of the Centerville Property Review Committee is necessary only for an appeal process, that the Code Enforcement Officer should have authority when violations are made known. Mrs. Simmons encouraged the development of a systematic inspection process for the maintenance of properties in the City of Centerville. She believes that the Code Official should not have the authority to adopt and promulgate rules and regulations to implement the provisions of the Code. She suggested that Section ES-801-4 "Garbage storage facilities" be eliminated or the wording be changed to conform to Permit requirements and standards requirements. Mrs. Simmons suggested that the Ordinance be indexed for quick reference.

Mr. Samples clarified the procedure to be followed when a complaint is registered with the City, in accordance with the proposed Ordinance. He believes that the Citizens of Centerville prefer home rule in this matter.

Mr. Singer moved that Ordinance Number 33-84, An Ordinance Establishing Minimum Standards Governing The Condition, Maintenance And Rehabilitation Of All Existing Structures; Establishing Minimum Standards Governing Supplied Utilities And Facilities And Other Physical Things And Conditions Essential To Insure That Structures Are Safe, Sanitary And Fit For Occupation And Use; Establishing Minimum Standards Governing The Condition Of Dwellings Offered For Rent; Fixing Certain Responsibilities And Duties Of Owners And Occupants Of Structures, And The Condemnation Of Structures Unfit For Human Habitation And The Demolition Of Such Structures; And Fixing Penalties For Violation, be tabled until the November 19, 1984 Council Meeting. Mr. Siler seconded the motion. A roll call vote resulted in seven ayes in favor of the motion.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 34-84 STATE ROUTE 48

The Public Hearing was held concerning Ordinance Number 34-84. Mr. Kenning reviewed this proposed Ordinance to provide for the City of Centerville in cooperation with the State of Ohio, Department of Transportation, to resurface and repair State Route 48 from just south of Edenhurst Drive to the south Corporation Line. The City's share in the cost is approximately \$10,000.00; the project is scheduled for the spring of 1985. Mr. Compton sponsored Ordinance Number 34-84, An Ordinance Enacted By The City Of Centerville, Montgomery County, Ohio, In The Matter Of The Hereinafter Described Improvement And To Request Cooperation By The Director Of Transportation, and moved that it be passed. Mr. Samples seconded the motion. A roll call vote resulted in seven ayes in favor of the motion.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 35-84 PLANNING COMMISSION

The Public Hearing was held concerning Ordinance Number 35-84. Mr. Singer sponsored Ordinance Number 35-84, An Ordinance To Appoint Robert J. Hosfeld To The City Planning Commission For The City Of Centerville, Ohio, To Fill The Unexpired Term Of Harry E. Williams, and moved that it be passed. Mr. Taylor seconded the motion. A roll call vote resulted in seven ayes in favor of the motion.
