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The Council of the City of Centerville, County of Montgomery, State of Ohio, met in Special Session, Tuesday, June 30, 1970 at 7:30 P.M. at the Municipal Building with Mayor Paul Hoy presiding. Councilmen present were as follows: John McIntire, John Davis, Harold Wells, J.V. Stone, John Zengel, City Manager John Griffin, City Engineer Frank Williams, Municipal Attorney Robert Farquhar, and Director of Finance Ronald Budzik.

Mr. McIntire sponsored Resolution Number 10-70: A Resolution Expressing The Appreciation Of The City Of Centerville To The Centerville Income Tax Committee And Its Members, and moved that it be adopted. Mr. Wells seconded the motion.

WHEREAS, various responsible citizens of the City have responded to the need of the City for additional revenue by forming the Centerville Income Tax Committee, and

WHEREAS, the said Committee members worked tirelessly for the passage of the 1.25% Municipal Income Tax;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MUNICIPALITY OF CENTERVILLE:

That the Council of the City of Centerville, on behalf of its citizens, hereby extends its sincere appreciation and thanks to the Centerville Income Tax Committee as a whole and to each of its members individually whose number is too great to list separately herein;

RESOLVED, FURTHER, that the Clerk of the Council is hereby authorized and directed to furnish sufficient copies of this Resolution to the Centerville Income Tax Committee to permit distribution to each member thereof.

A roll call vote resulted in six ayes in favor of the motion.

Mayor Hoy read a letter received from City Manager John Griffin in which he rescinded his action of June 26, 1970 and withdrew his resignation as City Manager of Centerville. Mr. Stone moved that Council meet in Closed Session for the purpose of discussing the subject of this letter. Mr. McIntire seconded the motion. A roll call vote resulted in six ayes in favor of the motion. Council met in Closed Session at 8:00 P.M., and returned to Public Session at 8:55 P.M.

Mayor Hoy read a letter received from Harold B. Horn, 231 Edgebrook Drive, congratulating Council on their determination to pass the City Income Tax by Ordinance.

Councilman Victor Green entered the Meeting at this time.

Mr. Stone sponsored Ordinance Number 30-70, An Ordinance Levying A tax To Provide Funds For The Purposes Of General Municipal Operations, Maintenance, New Equipment, Extension And Enlargement Of Municipal Services And Facilities, And Capital Improvements On All Salaries, Wages, Commissions And Other Compensation Earned By Residents Of The City Of Centerville; On All Salaries, Wages, Commissions And Other Compensation Earned By Non-Residents Of The City Of Centerville For Work Done Or Services Performed Or Rendered In The City Of Centerville; On The Net Profits Earned On All Businesses, Professions Or Other Activities Conducted By Residents Of The City Of Centerville; On The Net Profits Earned On All Businesses, Professions Or Other Activities Conducted In The City Of Centerville By Non-Residents; And On The Net Profits Earned By All Corporations Doing Business In The City Of Centerville; Requiring The Filing Of Returns And Furnishing Of Information By Employers And All Those Subject To Said Tax; Imposing On Employers The Duty Of Collecting The Tax At The Source And Paying The Same To The City Of Centerville; Providing For The Administration, Collection And Enforcement Of Said Tax; Declaring Violation Thereof To Be A Misdemeanor And Imposing Penalties Therefor, and moved that it be set for Public Hearing on July 13, 1970. Mr. Davis seconded the motion. A roll call vote resulted in seven ayes in favor of the motion. This Ordinance imposes an Income Tax of 1.00% beginning September 1, 1970 and continues to December 31, 1976.

Municipal Attorney Robert Farquhar reviewed Ordinance Number 31-70, An Ordinance imposing a .25% Income Tax beginning January 1, 1971 and continuing to December 31, 1976, this is in addition to the one percent tax imposed by Ordinance Number 30-70. It would not become effective until after passage by the electors on November 3, 1970. Mr. Stanley Weissman, 337 Pleasant Hill Drive wondered when action would be taken on the matter discussed in the Council Closed Session, and what would happen on July 1, 1970 concerning the City Manager. Mr. Farquhar advised that any final action on the matter discussed would have to appear on the agenda of a Public Meeting, and Mr. Griffin's letter of June 30, 1970 revokes his resignation letter of June 26, 1970.

Mr. Wells reviewed the Curb Cut Application submitted by Hugh H. Busse for one 16 foot Curb Cut to be located on the north side of West Franklin Street. This cut would provide access to a parking lot to serve local businesses in the center of town. The Planning Commission recommended approval of this Curb Cut according to the plan as submitted. Mr. Wells moved that the Curb Cut as requested by Hugh Busse be approved. Mr. Zengel seconded the motion. A roll call vote resulted in seven ayes in favor of the motion.

Director of Finance Ronald Budzik reviewed the proposed budget for 1971 to be submitted to the County Budget Commission after the Public Hearing before Council on July 13, 1970.


Council discussed the increase in complaints concerning garbage collection in the City. Mayor Hoy advised that a meeting will be arranged with the contractor to review these complaints, as soon as possible.

Mr. McIntire advised that he has been approached by residents in the Black Oak Estates area concerning the Sugar Creek Waste Disposal Plant. The Plant is creating a bad condition in their neighborhood. He requested that the County Sanitary Department expedite corrective action. The City Manager was requested to contact the County Sanitary Department and the County Administrator to determine what they can do at this time to correct this unpleasant situation.

Mrs. Marion Simmons, 1460 Taitwood Drive, read a statement concerning a moral aspect of the leakage of news items to the press and how it affects our City. She advised that the Officials have been elected to govern the City, they have been given the elector's trust and confidence in their honesty, integrity, reliability and sense of justice. Mrs. Simmons further stated that this leakage has made citizens suspicious of all Councilmen because they are unable to determine where the leak is and for what reasons. She suggested that public confidence could be restored if the responsible Councilman would identify himself and then resign.

The Meeting was then adjourned.
