

Section 3. It shall be a misdemeanor for any person to violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance and every person convicted or found guilty of a misdemeanor for a violation of any of the provisions hereof shall for a first offense thereof be fined not more than FIFTY (\$50.00) DOLLARS and for subsequent offenses, not less than TEN (\$10.00) DOLLARS and not more than ONE HUNDRED (\$100.00) DOLLARS.

Section 4. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances inconsistent herewith shall be repealed and this Ordinance shall take effect immediately by reason of the emergency character of the same. An emergency is declared to exist because of the immediate necessity of preventing a dangerous operation of motor vehicles upon the public streets and highways delineated herein which constitute a clear and present danger to the public safety and welfare.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 4-1959
VILLAGE OF CENTERVILLE, OHIO

AN ORDINANCE TO FIX THE SALARY OF THE VILLAGE MARSHAL AND TO CONFIRM THE APPOINTMENT OF JAMES R. SMITH AS VILLAGE MARSHAL OF THE VILLAGE OF CENTERVILLE, OHIO.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the Village of Centerville, State of Ohio:

Section 1. That effective January 1, 1959, the salary of the Village Marshal shall be Four Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$4,950.00) annually, payable inequal monthly installments.

Section 2. That the duly appointed Village Marshal shall be paid a uniform allowance to be used by him for the purchase and replacement of the standard uniform of dress prescribed and authorized by the Village Council in the sum of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) annually; and that said sum shall be paid to the Village Marshal at such times and in such amounts as the Village Council may direct.

Section 3. That the appointment of James R. Smith, 78 Laura Avenue, Centerville, Ohio, an elector of the said Village of Centerville, by the Mayor of Centerville as of the first day of January, 1959, is hereby ratified, approved and confirmed and he shall continue in office until removed therefrom as provided by law.

Section 4. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith shall be repealed and this ordinance shall take effect immediately, the same being passed as an emergency measure as provided by the statutes of Ohio, the said emergency existing by reason of the necessity for continuous police protection in the public interest and safety.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 5-1959
VILLAGE OF CENTERVILLE, OHIO

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE SALARY STRUCTURE AND RATE OF COMPENSATION FOR THE VILLAGE MARSHAL OF CENTERVILLE, OHIO FOR THE YEAR OF 1959.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the Village of Centerville, State of Ohio:

Section 1. Amending and substituting for Ordinance 4-1959 to the extent hereinafter stated, it is ordained that effective January 1, 1959 the salary of the Village Marshal of Centerville shall be FIVE THOUSAND ONE HUNDRED (\$5,100.00) DOLLARS annually, payable in equal monthly installments.

Section 2. That the duly appointed Village Marshall shall be paid a uniform allowance to be used by him for the purchase and replacement of the standard uniform of dress prescribed and authorized by the Village Council in the sum of FOUR HUNDRED (\$400.00) DOLLARS annually; and that said sum shall be paid to the Village Marshal at such times and in such amounts as the Village Council may direct.

Section 3. That the appointment of James R. Smith, 78 Laura Avenue, Centerville, Ohio, an elector of the said Village of Centerville, by the Mayor of Centerville as of the first day of January, 1959, is hereby ratified, approved and confirmed and he shall continue in office until removed therefrom as provided by law.

Section 4. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith shall be repealed and this ordinance shall take effect immediately, the same being passed as an emergency measure as provided by the statutes of Ohio, the said emergency existing by reason of the necessity for continuous police protection in the public interest and safety.
