SECTION 7. LIGHTS DURING BLACKOUT DECLARED PUBLIC NUISANCE. Any light displayed contrary to any order, rule or regulation promulgated pursuant to the provisions of this Ordinance constitutes a public nuisance and when deemed necessary in order to protect life or property during a blackout or air raid the police, or the special police authorized herein, are authorized and directed to enter upon any premises within the Village of Centerville, using reasonable force, and extinguish lights or take other necessary action to make effective any order, rule or regulation promulgated under the authority conferred by this ordinance.

SECTION 8. CONFLICTING ORDINANCES, ORDERS, RULES AND REGULATIONS SUSPENDED. At all times when the orders, rules and regulations made and promulgated pursuant to this ordinance shall be in effect, they shall supersede all existing ordinances, orders, rules and regulations insofar as the latter may be inconsistent therewith.

SECTION 9. NO CONFLICT WITH STATE OR FEDERAL STATUTES. This Ordinance shall not be construed so as to conflict with any State or Federal statute or with any Military or Naval order, rule or regulation.

SECTION 10. PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance or any order, rule or regulation issued pursuant thereto shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not exceeding Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) or imprisonment for not more than six months, or by both said fine and said imprisonment.

SECTION 11. SEPARABILITY OF PROVISIONS. It is the intention of the Village Council that each separate provision of this Ordinance shall be deemed independent of all other provisions herein, and it is further the intention of the Village Council that if any provision of this Ordinance be declared to be invalid, all other provisions thereof shall remain valid and enforceable.

SECTION 12. For the reason that a state of War now exists between the United States of America and certain European and Asiatic nations, thereby creating a hazard in that there is an immediate and constant threat of attack by enemy aircraft, this ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its due passage and approval.

ORDINANCE NO. 1 - 1943 AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE STANDING, OR PARKING OF VEHICLES UPON THE STREETS AND ALLEYS IN THE VILLAGE OF CENTERVILLE, IN THE COUNTY OF MONTGOMERY AND STATE OF OHIO.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the Village of Centerville, in the County of Montgomery and State of Ohio.

Section 1. No person shall stand, or park a vehicle, except when necessary to avoid conflict with other traffic or with the provisions of this ordinance, or in compliance with the directions of a police officer or a traffic-control device, in any of the following places:

1. On a sidewalk.

2. In front of a public or private driveway.

3. Within an intersection.

4. Within ten feet of a fire hydrant.

- 6. Within twenty feet of a crosswalk at an intersection.
- 7. Within fifty feet of a crosswalk at an intersection, where traffic is controlled by an automatic traffic signal.
- Alongside or opposite any street excavation or obstruction when such standing, or parking would obstruct traffic.
- 9. Alongside any vehicle stopped or parked at the edge or curb of a street.
- In any street or alley, where doing so would obstruct the ll. At any place where signs prohibit stopping.
- 12. Within one foot of another parked vehicle.

(a) Except where angle parking is permitted by signs or appropriate markings, every vehicle stopped or parked upon a street shall be stopped or parked with the right hand wheels of such vehicle parallel with and not more than twelve inches from the right hand curb line.

(b) No vehicle shall be stopped or parked on a street with the vehicle facing in a direction other than the direction of travel on that side of the street.

It is a misdemeanor for any person to violate any of the provisions of this ordinance and any person convicted or found guilty of a misdemeanor for a violation of any of the provisions thereof, shall, for a first offense thereof, be fined not more than Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars; and for a second offense within one year thereafter, not less than Ten (\$10.00) Dollars nor more than One hundred (\$100.00) Dollars, or imprisoned in the county jail or workhouse not more than ten days, or both; and for a third or subsequent offense within one year after the first offense shall be fined not less than Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars nor more than Two hundred (\$200.00) Dollars or imprisoned in the county jail or workhouse not more than thirty days, or both.

That this ordinance shall take effect from and after the earliest period allowed by law.
