Regular Meeting

The Council of the Village of Centerville, County of Montgomery and the State of Ohio, met in regular session, May 6, 1957 with Mayor Jackson presiding. Present; James Presbaugh, Frank Arnold Gilbert Neubauer, Robert Billett and William Dutcher. Visitors were Jack Pickerel, attorney and Mr. & Mrs. Roy Anderson.

The minutes of the previous meetings were read and approved.

It was moved by Mr. Billett that the request for the Ox Roast management to use the Village truck be granted, seconded by Mr. Arnold and carried. A roll call resulted in 5 ayes in favor of the motion.

The Mayor's report of Fines, Forfeitures and Costs amounting to \$232.60, Building permits amounting to \$40. , State Court cases amounting to \$392.70, showing that the same had been paid in the Village treasury was submitted. It was moved by Mr. Dutcher seconded by Mr. Neubauer and carried that the report be accepted and placed on file. A roll call was ordered which resulted in 5 ayes in favor of the motion.

Mr. Lynn then gave the second reading to Ord. 4-57.

Mr. Arnold introduced Ord.6-57, Being an Ordinance to amend Art.lv, Sec 3, of the Village of Centerville Zoning Ord.5-55, so as to provide for amendment in the method of classification of territory herinafter annexed to the Village of Centerville, was given its first reading by solicitor James Lynn.

The mayor announced that a group of citizens from tranquil trail and Normandy Lane were meeting in the town hall to discuss the pros and cons of being annexed to the Village, and invited the Council to attend to answer any questions relating to the Village, the meeting is scheduled for May 10, 7:30 P.M.

The council agreed to have a special meeting May 20, to discuss the possibility of sewers in the Village of Centerville, Financing and engineering being the main topics.

It was moved by Mr. Arnold, seconded by Mr. Dutcher, that the ^{Res. 2-1957} Council authorize ^{lv} the Village Engineer to begin initial survey plans for a possible development of an integrated sewer system and that an amount of \$500. not to be exceeded be used for such engineering services. A roll call was ordered which resulted in 5 eyes in favor of the motion.

The Clerk was authorized to send cards to all box-holders in the Village to inform them of the Dog Ordinance in force and abide by it.

The meeting adjourned.
