**Americana Festival** 

The Centerville-Washington Township Americana Festival Committee has tentatively announced that Ohio's largest single-day festival will return. The 2021 Americana Festival will be held on Monday, July 5.

Executive Director Keith Weiskittle cites Governor Mike DeWine's recent announcements as indications that the steering committee will be able to complete preparations, despite a condensed schedule leading up to the holiday.

In most years, the Americana Festival includes a 5K run, parade and street fair. The Centerville Community Band's Americana Concert is held the evening prior at Stubbs Park, followed by fireworks at the Centerville High School football stadium.

Those words reflect the vision for Uptown – the area along Main Street from Alex Bell Road to south of Franklin Street that encompasses the Architectural Preservation District at State Route 48 and Franklin Street. This area is truly the heart of Centerville, home to nearly 100 businesses and our community's rich history.

The City completed a comprehensive visioning process for Uptown in 2019 with a focus group of more than a dozen stakeholders representing businesses, residents, government partners and community groups.

The Uptown Action Plan highlights six focus areas: improving walkability and reducing traffic congestion, improving parking, scheduling and organizing new events, focusing on business development, developing branding and increasing greenspace.



### **UPTOWN UPGRADES**

The City of Centerville is proud to announce 'Uptown Upgrades,' a grant program with three components to incentivize façade and streetscape improvements and encourage public art.

### Historic Façade Improvement Grants

Uptown Historic Façade Improvement Grants are designed to encourage building and business owners in the City's Architectural Preservation District (APD) to invest in façade improvements and exterior building upgrades that address code enforcement violations.

The program aims to alleviate conditions that could negatively impact public health and safety. In addition, these targeted investments will prevent the spread of blighting influences to adjacent properties throughout the district.

The grants will be supported by \$75,000 of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds provided by Montgomery County. Grants will be provided as a 1:1 match for eligible costs up to \$15,000 per building.

Examples of eligible projects include reconstructing deteriorated façades, replacing structurally compromised decks and porches and addressing peeling paint.

### Uptown Streetscape Funds

Uptown Streetscape Funds are designed to encourage high-quality building, streetscape and aesthetic enhancements that contribute to the character and vibrancy of Uptown. The funds will incentivize businesses to make investments that align with the strategies of the Uptown Action Plan.

The Centerville Community Improvement Corporation (CCIC) will use \$50,000 of its funds to initiate the Uptown Streetscape Funds. Funds will be provided through forgivable loans, matched 1:1 up to \$10,000 per building.

Examples of eligible projects include construction of outdoor patios, activated spaces, landscaping, building modifications to accommodate new businesses and signage. Whereas the Historic Façade Improvement Grants are limited to buildings in the APD, the Uptown Streetscape Funds will have a larger footprint within the boundaries of Uptown Centerville.

### Centerpieces Mural Program

Centerpieces is a mural program designed to encourage high-quality visual art in Uptown by creating opportunities for murals and public art that enhance the district's visual appeal. The proposed mural program will be a partnership between the Centerville Arts Commission and the CCIC.

Once a mural location is identified, the city will seek artists' designs for consideration. Designs would be reviewed and scored by a committee made up of representatives from the Arts Commission, CCIC and community stakeholders.


### Retirees





### **Stormwater**

April showers don't just bring May flowers, they also provide flow to local creeks, streams and rivers. After rainwater falls, it flows over the ground and into a storm sewer that will direct it to a local waterway. Along the way, the rainwater can pick up pollutants that are in its path. These pollutants will be carried by the rainwater to local waterways that we rely on and will negatively affect their overall health. Some of the most common pollutants carried by rainwater are motor oil and car fluids on streets and driveways. It is important to fix car leaks and clean stains off your driveway to prevent this type of pollution. Also, it is important to avoid spilling motor oil when changing the oil in your car or mower. And never pour leftover oil down storm drains.

### **Waste Billing**
