WHEREAS, the network encourages states, counties, cities and rural areas to prepare for the rapid aging of our nation's population and encourages elected and local leaders to strengthen the features and services that help make communities livable for all residents; and

WHEREAS, the City of Centerville supports the Centerville Age-Friendly Action Plan and engagement with community partners to determine actions to be pursued in support of the identified strategies; and

WHEREAS, the Centerville City Council previously indicated support for initiatives and opportunities to engage in the Network of Age-Friendly Cities and Communities that encourage and promote public policies supporting healthy aging; directed the application to AARP to join the Network of Age Friendly Communities; and directed the convening of the Age Friendly Centerville Initiative to actively seek input from diverse stakeholders, including older residents, to evaluate current and potential age friendly initiatives, services, and programming in our community and to develop an action plan specific to the City of Centerville; and

WHEREAS, the Centerville Age Friendly Action Plan was presented to City Council on September 16, 2024.

NOW THEREFORE, THE MUNICIPALITY OF CENTERVILLE HEREBY RESOLVES:

Section 1. That the Age-Friendly Action Plan, attached hereto and marked as Exhibit "A" be hereby adopted by the City of Centerville, Ohio.



Executive Summary

According to the United States Census Bureau estimates, the City of Centerville has a population of 24,250. Of that, 29.4% are residents aged 65 and older. According to a June 2, 2023 Dayton Daily News article, Centerville has the "oldest population in the state." The City is dedicated to addressing issues affecting the growing population of older adults. The Age-Friendly Focus Group, comprised of stakeholders in our community, is charged with collaborating with institutions, organizations and staff to explore and prepare for a better future for residents of all ages. A Community Livability Survey was conducted in the Summer of 2023. The results provided the data upon which the Centerville Age-Friendly Action Plan is based, noting the top three areas of focus: housing, communication and information and civic participation and employment.

Age-Friendly Designation Process

The City of Centerville joined the rapidly expanding AARP Network of Livable Communities (ALCN) in 2021 to utilize the ALCN template to evaluate and identify where and how the City of Centerville could help to create a more equitable future for residents of all ages. This work was done in partnership with The Dayton Foundation and Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission.

In 2023, the City conducted a Community Living survey using portions of a template developed and approved by the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP). The survey was mailed to more than 13,000 Centerville addresses and requested feedback on issues related to safety, accessibility, recreation and overall satisfaction. More than 900 valid responses were received.

In 2023, an Age-Friendly Focus Group was created to assess the findings of the survey and create an action plan. Selecting members for the Focus Group involved an open call for interest as well as requests to stakeholder organizations, institutions and businesses. The group created goals and objectives to address what they selected as focus areas: housing, communication and information and civic participation.

The Focus Group will meet annually to evaluate progress on the Age-Friendly Action Plan.

Age-Friendly Survey Results

The survey was available for all residents of Centerville aged 18 and older. The survey was mailed to 13,537 households in the City of Centerville. A total of 962 valid responses were received. The online survey measured:

- Satisfaction with quality of life
- Why residents choose to live in Centerville
- Things that make life difficult in Centerville
- Highlights to show visitors in the City and things to avoid
- Resident suggestions for change and improvement
- Resident aspirations for the future of Centerville
- Future plans to stay or leave their current residence
- Business and economic development
- Mobility, safety and transportation
- City services
- Demographics

Overall, resident satisfaction is extremely high in Centerville. People love Centerville because of:

- High-quality schools
- A feeling of safety and peace
- The positive and strong community
- Wonderful neighborhoods and parks
- Quality shopping accessible to them

There were some concerns and suggestions on how to preserve the qualities they love about Centerville and improve where needed. The most frequently mentioned issues were:

- Taxation and affordability
 - Property taxes, particularly for retirees
- Traffic and infrastructure
 - Road conditions and parking issues
 - Traffic flow in Uptown
 - Speeds in residential areas
- Community connectivity and safety
 - Adding more sidewalks, bike lanes and crosswalks
 - More multi-use trails and gathering areas
 - Community activities that bring people together

91% of respondents were either satisfied or very satisfied with the City.

Age-Friendly Action Plan

Focus Area One: Housing

AARP surveys consistently find that the vast majority of older adults want to reside in their current home or community for as long as possible. Doing so is possible if a home is designed or modified for aging in place, or if a community has housing options that are suitable for differing incomes, ages and life stages.

- 1. Conduct a windshield survey of property conditions
- 2. Review and update existing Centerville Housing Study
 - i. Break down geographic areas of need and opportunity
- 3. Identify programs to help homeowners
 - i. Incorporate a façade improvement program for single-family homes
 - ii. Connect residents with aid for service needs
- 4. Identify opportunities for increasing housing stock for older residents
- 5. Create a registry of problem properties and those delinquent on property taxes
- 6. Create rules and standard operating procedures for rental properties
- 7. Promote Community Reinvestment Area opportunities



Focus Area Two: Communication and Information

We now communicate in ways few could have imagined a decade ago. Age-friendly communities recognize that information needs to be shared through a variety of methods since not everyone is tech-savvy, and not everyone has a smartphone or home-based access to the internet.
